## **Executive Summary**

## District Strategic Plan 2025

Orange County Public Schools is the ninth-largest school district in the United States and the fourth largest in Florida. The district serves more than 206,000 students at 202 schools and is one of the largest employers in Central Florida with more than 25,000 team members.

Vision: To ensure every student has a promising and successful future.

**Mission:** With the support of families and the community, we create enriching and diverse pathways to lead our students to success.

## School Collection Development Plan

Bay Lake Elementary School serves 700 students enrolled in Kindergarten through fifth grades. The student population's ethnicity is made up of 50% Hispanic and 50% Non-Hispanic students. Additionally, we serve a diverse population made up of 80% White, 7% Black, 0% Native, 11% Asian, 0% Pacific, and 3% Multicultural students.

The administration includes Principal Ms. Lakeitha Mincey and Assistant Principal, Ms. Heather Trick. Bay Lake Elementary School is proud to offer the many special programs which provide students with opportunities. These include National Honor Society, PAWS/FALLS Learning Labs, Safety Patrol, Media Crew Club, Art Club & Chorus Club.

A thorough analysis of the current media center collection at Bay Lake Elementary School indicates that the average age of the collection is 2014 and the number of books per student is 11. The <u>American Association for School Libraries</u> has established a criteria for a highly effective media center that includes a ratio of 15-20 books available per student in the collection. At this time, Bay Lake Elementary School does not meet the recommended standards for the number of books per student.

The analysis of the collection also revealed the following areas of strengths and concerns:

- Many of our students read in their native language as well as emerging second language readers. This is a need in our collection.
- Hispanic students are 50% of the school's population. However, we only have 15 titles written in Spanish and 15% of the characters or biographies feature Hispanic people.
- Bay Lake average collection is 2014. The district recommendation is 2007.
- In addition to the books that are provided to our school our students have access to 1259 through Sora and 1,351 through Destiny.
- Leveled books are an average of 3rd grade. Lower level books are needed for struggling readers. 92 items are found for Lexile Level Br-199.
- Purchases of new books will focus on Hispanic students and Hispanic heritage.








2013 Representative Titles Average Age
